

Barney's 'wife'

Herb Moses, Washington mortgage banker and live-in companion of Rep. Barney Frank, Massachusetts Democrat, has finally come forward to discuss their relationship.

In an interview with Genre, a magazine for homosexuals, Mr. Moses talks about going to the White House for a casual dinner with their friend Bill. It's not the first such invitation for the congressman and his 37-year-old partner, who gets a kick out of being called a "Washington wife."


