## Defend children

Kudos to Bill Smithwick's defense of children. Boo to John Birkimer's Sept. 14 defense of the American Psychological Association's publication, "Assumed Properties of Child Sexual Abuse Using College Samples." This APA publication conforms to the

American Psychiatric Association's 1994 removal of pedophilia as a disorder from their diagnostic manual.

Unless stopped, the psychological APA will normalize pedophilia—for its "sexuality" training is grounded in the fraudulent Kinsey Reports (1948-1953). Kinsey is the basis for both APAs normalizing homosexuality. Now they'd normalize pedophilia on this basis: Kinsey is the first and only "scientist" to publish child sex experiments conducted by pedophiles. Kinsey said this "proved" children are sexual from birth.

Two of the APA authors are publicly pro-pedophile. Author Bruce Rind wrote a pro-pedophile piece for the Journal of Pedophilia—which advertises for NAMBLA, the North American Man-Boy Love Association. Ditto APA author Robert Bauserman who in a 1990 Journal of Homosexuality article sought "scientific objectivity" about man-boy sex.

Birkimer says the APA Web site says child "abuse" is wrong? Really? When children in pedophile experiments convulsed, screamed and fought "the partner," Kinseyans said that was pleasure, not "abuse." Similarly the APA authors feel a "willing (sexual) encounter" between an adult and a child should "be labeled simply 'adult-child sex,' a value-neutral term," instead of "abuse." Kinsey declared adult-child sexual encounters an aid to a "child's sexual development" and the APA is fast approaching Kinsey's view.

Should Birkimer really study the matter he will find both APAs, like their higher authority on sexual matters, Kinsey, would have us accept pedophilia and repudiate our historical view of adult-child sex as just plain "harmful." Child advocates agree with APA child psychologist Wade Horn who said, "The more I delve into this, the more disturbing I find the APA's position on various issues."

## Kinsey Sex Report Based on Pedophiles

A 20-year struggle by a crusading researcher to expose the influential Kinsey Sex Report of the 1950's as a dangerous scientific fraud is finally receiving serious attention in an explosive, British TV documentary.

"Kinsey's Paedophiles" by filmmaker Tim Tate highlights the work of Judith A. Reisman, an American whose two books on "the father of the sexual revolution" have been blackballed by elites in the United States.

In "Kinsey: Crimes and Consequences," published last year, Mrs. Reisman calls Alfred Kinsey's fraud the major scientific scandal of our nation, perpetrated by a man she discovered to have been "dramatically driven by his own sexual perversions."

Although the Tate film is widely disseminated in the English-speaking world and parts of Europe, like the Reisman books it has been suppressed by the U.S. corporate media.

In the U.S., Kinsey remains an important ideological fixture in the world view of left-wing intellectuals and cosmopolitan social leaders.

In post-war America, Kinsey's research was used by flourishing managerial elites to attack the sexual mores and values of Middle America by moving courts and legislatures to change or abolish laws against certain sexual practices such as extramarital sex and child abuse.

The single most lasting influence of Kinsey's research is that it provided the scientific coloring for a national campaign to teach sexual behavior to public school children, which is still popular today.

"Kinsey insisted that children should engage in sex joyfully," says Reisman. "Today we now have graphic, really obscene material in the classroom. They are given to children under the umbrella of sex education, or taught as 'health' or 'family life education' or AIDS prevention."

When he burst on the scene fifty years ago, Kinsey had a tremendous impact on how elites decided to mold the public consciousness. A publicity campaign funded by the wealthy left-wing Rockefeller Foundation found an eager media to ensure that the "sex report" made news headlines across the country. Kinsey was featured in a *Time* magazine cover story that portrayed him, in Mrs. Reisman's words, as a "noble man, a scientist, and a family man."

Kinsey titillated the corporate media by claiming that "95 percent of American men were engaged in some form of illegal sexual conduct," Mrs. Reisman says, "and

that most married people had had premarital sex, that the majority of men went to prostitutes, that homosexuality was common...that adultery was common."

The claim that Americans were "all hypocrites" about sex was accepted, according to Reisman, because Kinsey — whose original expertise was the study of insects — was seen as an objective scientist.

"It was a Madison Avenue campaign to normalize Kinsey's view on sexuality," she said. That view—including the claim that "children are sexual from birth"—had a major impact because Kinsey was depicted as a scientist at a time when the nation was really enamored of science and scientists."

But contrary to the public relations image paid for by the Rockefeller family wealth, Kinsey's research was based on interviews with sex offenders and prisoners. In addition, says Reisman, Kinsey's conclusions about Americans' sexual practices were warped by a set of data corrupted by biased interview techniques and the use of unverified "reports" from child molesters.

The Tate film's hour-long expose on Kinsey identifies a pedophile — "Mr. X" — whose accounts of hundreds of sexual "contacts" with children were used in the Kinsey Reports as examples of typical American sexual behavior. Mr. X turns out to be a federal Forestry Service employee named Rex King.

"It strikes me that there must be a number of people who are adults now who were the victims of Rex King who have no idea what was done with the information," Mr. Tate says, noting that King's victims are now 50 to 75 years old.

King's sordid accounts were "used by Kinsey...to suggest that children can enjoy their abuse," Tate said. "Unless that film is shown [in the United States] those adults won't know. I think they have a right to know."

Tate says he is "disappointed" his documentary has yet to be shown in America.

The first Kinsey Report distorted reality, coming at a time says Reisman, when there was little sexual dysfunction, low rates of

divorce and illegitimacy, and sex outside marriage was considered immoral.

That Kinsey was able to pull it off was due, Reisman believes, to the tendency of people to unquestioningly accept things that are cloaked in scientific language and presented by a university or scientific institution. Of course, the weight thrown behind Kinsey's fraudulent studies by elites anxious to discredit cultural forces opposed to their ideology played a large role.

Kinsey's own personal life has also triggered doubts about his purported "scientific" interest. A 1977 biography by James Jones detailed his sexual involvement with associates at the Kinsey Institute at Indiana University, which included filming sex acts between Kinsey, his wife, his staffers and their wives in various combinations.

Asserts Reisman: he "judged your happiness as a human being by the number of orgasms you had."

In her book, Reisman writes that his view of sexuality has been so widely accepted that people "have forgotten that we weren't always like this."

Much of the intense, sometimes rabid and irrational opposition to any investigation of Kinsey's fraud is explained in part by the role organizations such as Planned Parenthood and the Sexuality Information and Education Council of the United States play in promoting "Kinseyan sexuality" through sex education in the public schools.

"They've been instructing our children for years using fraudulent data," Mrs. Reisman says. "As experts, they were responsible for the product they were delivering — product liability if you will. This will make the cigarette companies look like nothing, in terms of legal responsibility."

For his part, Tim Tate continues his campaign to get Mrs. Reisman's findings before the American public but remains frustrated by hostility from the corporate media.

"It's really about the abuse of children and also it's about how that's been covered up. That's wrong and it's dangerous," says Tate.
