Concerned Women of America join anti-Kinsey crusade

Dr. Reisman, RSVP America seek 'army' to fight Kinsey

Editor's note: What follows is the final story in a four-part series about the efforts of Dr. Judith Reisman and an organization called RSVP America to discredit the work of sex researcher Dr. Alfred Kinsey, and to remove his influence from American society.

A group of congressmen told a Crestwood mother two years ago that she was facing opposition from some of the most powerful forces in America—the pornography industry, the pro-abortion lobby and gay rights activists.

The congressmen said that if Eunice Ray wanted to bring down famed researcher Dr. Alfred Kinsey and the principles of sexuality he promulgated, she would have to come back to Washington "with an army."

Ray hopes RSVP America will become that army, an army of parents, "outraged over Kinsey's sexual abuse of children" and determined that his "skewed research" will not be taught to another generation.

And she hopes to give that army its marching orders in 1998—the 50th anniversary of Kinsey's



bombshell book *Sexual Behavior in the Human Male*, a book that changed forever America's view of human sexuality.

"A jubilee is an important occasion," says the 48-year-old homemaker, home-schooler and social activist who put together the organization whose acronym stands for Restoring Social Virtue and Purity (to) America. "Fifty years is a milestone. It's a time for retrospection. And that's exactly what we want—a retrospective look at the post-Kinsey years. Let's look back over the past 50 years and see if we are, as a nation, better off for the changes that have resulted from the information Kinsey disseminated."

Ray charges that it is "painfully

obvious" that America has suffered perhaps irreparable harm from the information Kinsey derived from "flawed samples" and "sexual abuse."

Eunice Ray became involved in the anti-Kinsey crusade in 1992 when she was an appointee of the Bush administration to a committee studying the role of women in the military. She heard that a woman named Judith Reisman, Ph.D., a researcher on women's and men's issues, might provide valuable input.

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"Judith came to our hotel room in Washington and spent the whole evening opening my eyes to something I had never before put together in my head," Ray said. "She explained to me how the research of Dr. Alfred Kinsey was at the root of an unbelievable number of social problems—from the rising divorce and teenage pregnancy rates, to the pornography industry and abortion. She tied it all together for me for the first time. Then she explained how Kinsey's results came from distorted information and illegal acts."

Dr. Reisman's research showed Kinsey's samples included prison inmates, 1,400 of whom were sex offenders, and several hundred male prostitutes. She also focused worldwide attention on tables in Kinsey's text that showed the number of orgasms experienced by children as young as 5 months old—data gathered by a pedophile.

"I am a baby boomer," Ray said. "And I know that most baby boomers don't know how we went from chastity to condoms in just one generation. We have lived through it and now we live with it, but we don't know where it came from. And most baby boomers certainly don't realize that our own children are

going to get a double dose of what we have had—that even though a school's sex-education teachers may be well-meaning, what they're teaching is based on the research of a man who got his information on 'normal childhood sexuality' from a pedophile molesting children. You don't find out 'normal' from a pervert!"

Ray was so infuriated by what she learned that she determined to do something about it. She found out that the Family Research Council was working on a video called *The Children of Table 34*, that would tell the story of the "systematic molestation of at least 317 children" to provide the data for Kinsey's research. She knew that the video would spark outrage in those who viewed it. But she also knew that the viewers would have no way to act on their outrage.

"There had to be some organization in place to channel the efforts of the people who wanted to take action against the Kinsey Institute," she said. "That's how RSVP America was born."

The video also called for a congressional investigation of the Kinsey Institute at Indiana University at Bloomington, and that legislation was drafted "on a hillside in Crestwood" a few months later.

Eunice Ray's husband is Ron

Ray, an attorney who moved his law practice from the downtown Louisville Starks Building to a home office in Crestwood, where he has devoted the practice to public affairs issues. (It was Ron Ray who defended Michael New, the soldier who refused to wear the uniform of the United Nations.)

The Rays found a Texas congressman to sponsor the legislation, and it was introduced into Congress in 1995. But it died there in 1996 for lack of action. It was at that time that supportive congressmen spelled out the facts of life to Eunice Ray. Gather an "army" of support, they told her, or you will not defeat the powerful forces lined up against you.

Where do you find an army? Ray wondered. Well, you could either start your own, or find one that already existed and enlist its support, she figured.

Ray decided to do both.

"If you think about it, Concerned Women for America is an army," Ray said of the 600,000-member Christian organization founded by Beverly LaHaye. "I knew that if Christians did not unite and act on this issue, we would not prevail."

So Ray met with LaHaye and laid out for her Dr. Reisman's information about Dr. Kinsey. She showed LaHaye that Kinsey was a bisexual and a masochist

who "used his research to put forward his own distorted sexual agenda." She documented how, in the last 50 years, that research had been the "scientific" justification to lessen penalties for sex crimes, and how it became the engine that drove the trains of pornography, abortion, sexual abuse, divorce and moral decline. She pointed out how the molestation of 317 children had been used to form Kinsey's assertion that "children are sexual from birth," and she explained how that assertion had become the basis for sex education courses all across America.

LaHaye immediately agreed to throw the support of Concerned Women for America behind the RSVP America campaign against Kinsey.

"I chose the RSVP name not only because of what the letters stand for, but because RSVP is an invitation, and this movement is an invitation for Americans to get involved," she said. "This is a work that will have a beginning and an end. We want to take Kinsey's bogus report and demolish it as a scholarly work, and we want to root it out of our institutions."

RSVP's plan of attack in 1998 is one of exposure, Ray said.

"We want to focus as much attention as possible on Kinsey's bogus data and the fact that it is used as the scientific source for sex education in our schools," she said.

CWA and RSVP America will seek a sponsor in 1998 for legislation to investigate the Kinsey Institute, and the groups will foster a grassroots campaign of mothers to confront the issue in their own children's schools.

RSVP America has prepared "a basket of materials" for mothers to use in that effort. In the packet are *The Children of Table 34* video, a training manual, and a curriculum evaluator that parents can use to determine if the materials their children are being taught in school are based on the

Kinsey model.

"This isn't rocket science," Ray said. "Being a mom or a dad is as important as being a Ph.D. in this issue. You can look at your children's sex education materials and tell if Kinsey is being used. If it is, you need to go boldly to the school or the school board and state your concern. Surely after 50 years it is obvious that Kinsey's sexual revolution has not made America better off—not by any measure. It hasn't worked! It couldn't work, because it was all based on a lie. That's the message we have to get out."

Ray had even loftier goals as well. She wants to see the legislative investigation uncover the truth about Kinsey's "fraud and criminal acts" and she wants that information to become the basis for cutting off federal funding to any organization that continues to use the Kinsey model.

But she admits that hers is an uphill battle.

"As social activists, we fight—on spare change and spare time—people who are funded by our tax dollars," she says. "But God has promised in 2 Chronicles 14: 'If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land.'"
