Dr. Kinsey has found that in the institute's sample the individual variations of sexual behavior among women are much greater than those among men. 

Schulte Says Author 'Has Degraded Science

Indianapolis, Aug. 20 (A)
The president of Indiana University today defended the sex research of Dr. Alfred C. Kinsey, while a Roman Catholic archibishop deplored general circulation of his published works outside scientific circles.

Dr. Herman B Wells, president of the Bloomington institution where Dr. Kinsey is a professor of zoology, issued his statement with approval of the I. U. board of directors.

"Indiana University stands today, as it has for 15 years," Dr. Wells said, "firmly in support of the scientific-research project that has been undertaken and is being carried on by one of the scientific scientists,

is being carried on by one of its eminent biological scientists, Dr. Alfred C. Kinsey."

'Like A Cheap Charlatan.'

The Most Rev. Paul C. Schulte, rne Most Rev. Paul C. Schulte, bishop of the Indianapolis arch-diocese, which includes Bioom-ington said Dr. Kinsey "has de-graded science" by publicizing his books "like a cheap charla-tan."

Dr. Wells said Indiana, University "believes that the human race has been able to make progress because individuals have been free to investigate all aspects of life." He continued:

"It further believes that only through scientific knowledge so gained can we find the cures for the emotional and social maladles in our society.

Proud of I.U.'s Cosponsor

"In support of Dr. Kinsey's research the university is proud to have as cosponsor the National Research Council and its distinguished committee of scientists and physicians in charge of studies of this nature. With the chairman of that committee I chairman of that committee I agreed in saying that we have large faith in the values of knowledge, little faith in ignorance.

Archbishop Schulte, commenting on the first publication of reviews of Kinsey's new "Sexual Behavior in The Human Female," said:

"Every self-respecting Hoosier must profoundly regret the notariety that Dr. Kinsey has brought our renowned university. Dr. Kinsey has degraded science. Instead of circulating his findings amon g those competent to weigh their worth and apply them to the betterment of mankind, he publicizes them like a cheap charlatan. endangering society."

Bloomington, Ind., Aug. 22.— In its 15-year endeavor to push pack the frontiers of ignorance about sex, the Institute for Sex Research takes its strongest and most forthright step in "Sexual Behavior In The Human Female."

Although not entirely within the context of a book about female behavior, new information on the problem of the sex offender is distributed throughout many

It can rightly be called shockchapters. ing information, because it reveals a state of near hysteria in some states of the nation. And in most states, the book discloses sex laws that are as far from the facts of life as man is from the

Cites Indiana as Example

Said Dr. Alfred C. Kinsey, president of the institute, "About 95 per cent of the males and 85 per cent of the females in this country would be behind bars at some time in their lives if our sex cause people are wicked, but because our laws are so outdated."

As an example, he cited the State of Indiana. agement of masturbation" is a crime in Indiana. The penalty for contributing to the delinquency of a minor is now five years in or a minor is now live years in prison. Any boy who has ever petted with a girl under 21 could be sent away for five years."

"Some sex laws are downright unenforceable," he continued. "The gap between the law and the less than one per cent of the population who are actually con-victed of sex offenses leads to blackmail and extortion. We have as black a record as anywhere in the world in the way police handle our sex cases.

"We have found these cases right here in our penal institu-tions, men committed there because of police blackmail rings."

California Is Cited

As an example of a place where "society is hysterical" over the problem of sex offenders, Dr. Kinsey cited California. After three children were killed in sex attacks, Governor Earl Warren Teceived thousands of letters from angry citizens demanding action. A special session of the State Legislature was called to consider a castration law. Dr. Kinsey was at San Quentin Prison time, taking sex histories

Used on 'Dealing Basis'

Dr. Kinsey said "hundreds" of men have been castrated in California in an attempt to control sex offenders. This has been done by three judges, he said, who use castration on a "dealing" basis. The defendant is given a choice of a long prison sentence or castration and a one-year probation. Many accept castration rather than the long prison term.

Several states are considering castration laws now, Dr. Kinsey said, and one State has under consideration a bill that would put a man in prison "only on suspicion that he might be capable of a sex offense."

The institute has been working with legislative commissions of 12 states on sex laws, and Dr. Kinsey repeatedly emphasized that "we never recommend what they should put into law, we only report what we have found. We are not attempting to establish public policy.'

Prepared to Submit Bill

The institute was asked by New York State to study the sexual effect on individuals who had prefrontal lobotomies, a brain operation that has been held to change patterns of behavior. Dr. Kinsey said the head of the penal system in another state was prepared to submit a bill to the Legislature requiring the operation for every sex offender.

Kinsey and his associates found the operation had "no discernible effect" on the sex capacity of persons on whom it had been performed.

Consideration of laws requiring the brain operation or castration for sex offenders was described by Dr. Kinsey as "an at-tempt to-find a single answer to all our problems."

He placed part of the blame for irrational handling of sex of-fenders on the wide variation of individual differences in sexual make-up. He told of a Minnesota case in which a man was sent to prison, adjudged a sex offender because he wanted coitus four times a week. Kinsey said the judge in the case and the physician who advised the court were evidently incapable of sexual intercourse that often.

TWO DISTINGUISHED Louisvilliams journeyed to Saratoga Springs, N. Y., 75 years ago this month for a significant meeting.

There, Benjamin Helm Bristow and James Speed Pirtle, with about 70 other lawyers from 19 states and the District of Columbia, founded the American Bar Association.

Today through Friday, the association is honoring its founders at its Diamond Jubilee meeting at Boston.

The Post Office Department has authorized issuance of a special stamp in honor of the A.B.A. Diamond Jubilee year. The stamp goes on sale tomorrow at Boston as a feature of the convention. The Louisville Bar Association hopes to arrange a ceremony later to mark the start of the sale of the stamps-here.

Played Major Roles

Both Bristow and Pirtle played important roles at the Saratoga session.

Bristow then presided over the historic first meeting, and was second president of A.B.A.

Pirtle was chosen to help write the constitution, which was so expertly worded that, except for a fe v additions, it has remained unchanged to this day. Under it, A.B.A. achievements have included enactment of the present National Bankruptcy Act, uniform rules of court procedure in federal courts, present canons judicial and professional ethics, legal-aid services and the Lawyers' Referral Service.

Was Cabinet Member

Bristow, born at Elkton, Ky., in 1832, served as Secretary of the Treasury under President U. S. Grant from 1874 to 1876. and was the first appointed so-

In Grant's Administration, he prosecuted the Whisky Ring, an organization centered at St. Louis which defrauded the Government of millions of dollars. This may have cost him the presidency. He was a prominent candidate for the Republican nomination in 1876; but when his own nomination appeared impossible, he threw his support to Rutherford B. Hayes.

Son of Judge

Bristow served with Union forces in the Civil War, and later was a State senator and district attorney at Louisville. In the 1880's and until he died in 1896, he practiced law in New York. Pirtle, son of Judge Henry

Pirtle, was born here in 1840.

He taught at the University of Louisville Law School, and was head of the school from 1887 to 1905. First president of the Filson Club, he also served as president of the Louisville City National Bank, the American Printing House for the Blind, and the board of visitors of the Kentucky Institute for Education of the Blind.

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
